

Eggciting news...

On Thursday 13th of March, nine eggs from our school chickens were put into the incubator. They will take 20 days to incubate and are due to hatch on Wednesday 2nd April just before the holidays. 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Year 1 & 2

In Global Curriculum and History, we've been looking past to parts in Germany's past to try and understand the country we live in a bit more! In RSE we've looked at stereotypes and how we can't always trust them because everyone is unique.

In English Year 1 and 2 we have been reading the story 'The Hundred Dresses' by Eleanor Estes. We wrote an informal letter pretending to be one of the characters, apologising to another character Wanda for the way she was being treated. This evoked lots of discussion about 'What is fair?' and the different types of emotive vocabulary we could use. In Science, the children were really engaged learning about the problems being caused to the world's rainforests and oceans, and how 'we' as humans can help to prevent further damage.

Year 3

In English this term, Year 3 have been working hard exploring the books 'Welcome to Trashland' and 'The Great Food Bank Heist'. They have studied themes of poverty, and produced fantastic narratives exploring alternative endings to the stories, whilst expanding their grammatical and creative writing skills. In Maths, the children have enjoyed studying fractions and money (even more exciting to see what English money looks like for some!) They have particularly enjoyed 'shopping' with Mrs Ward, working out how much change and money they would need for certain items in her 'shop'!

Year 4

Year 4 have been studying the work of Artist 'Alberto Giacometti'. Famous for his elongated human figures cast from bronze, the children used wire to create their own sculptures inspired by his originals. They then sculpted their wire frame into a human pose, covered them in foil and painted them with a bronze effect paint. We'll now wait for them to dry to see the finished result!



Year 5 & 6

The spring term has seen Year 5 and 6 delving into powerful themes such as identity, racial discrimination, and justice through their writing, inspired by Black Brother, Black Brother by Jewell Parker Rhodes. After engaging in thought-provoking oracy sessions on racism and fair treatment, learners have crafted suspenseful narrative monologues, stepping into the shoes of key characters to explore their emotions. Through their writing, they have brought the story to life, capturing moments of suspense, with stories ending with a moral and just conclusion.
